

ith a seemingly endless series of challenges and obstacles over the last few years, including devastating wildfires, protocol resets, health and safety concerns, supply chain shortages and industry-wide labor disputes, the entertainment and sports industries somehow manage to succeed, with creativity and innovation – always hallmarks of show business – sparking silver linings and trends that may actually benefit some sub-sectors of the industry long-term. The LA Times Studios team turned to three uniquely knowledgeable experts for their thoughts and insights about how Southern California's powerhouse entertainment and sports business sectors can continue to blaze new and creative paths to success. The following article excerpts highlights from that commentary.

What do you consider to be the most challenging obstacles facing the industry in 2025?

In 2025, the entertainment and sports industries face several complex challenges from an employment law perspective. These obstacles are multifaceted and impact both the operational and legal frameworks within which businesses operate. Some of the challenges we anticipate our clients facing are issues with worker classification and employment status, unionization and collective bargaining, technological disruption and the impact of artificial intelligence, and as the American sports industry continues to go international, we anticipate more complex compliance

How are new venue developments, such as SoFi Stadium and Intuit Dome, shaping the sports and entertainment landscape in L.A.?

Venues like SoFi Stadium and the Intuit Dome are no longer just sports arenas; they're financial powerhouses. These venues are designed to generate year-round revenue through multi-use facilities, entertainment partnerships and techdriven fan experiences. The unique and diverse landscape of L.A. sports venues will allow L.A. to continue to take advantage of major events such as the Olympics, the World Cup, Super Bowl and numerous other world-class events for decades. Financing of these projects has also evolved, with more private investment, long-term sponsorshipbacked lending and digital payment integration driving profitability. From a banking standpoint, these venues represent a shift toward infrastructure-backed financial models, where diversified revenue streams ensure sustained capital arowth beyond traditional ticket and event sales.

Q

How has the shift to NIL affected collegiate sports in the region?

The shift to NIL rights in collegiate sports has had significant implications from an employment law perspective, fundamentally altering the relationship between athletes, schools and thirdparty businesses. While this change has been celebrated by many, it has introduced various challenges and legal considerations, including employment status and classification issues: One of the most significant questions arising from the NIL shift is whether student-athletes should be classified as employees. If athletes are viewed as employees, this could have substantial legal consequences in terms of labor protections (e.g., workers' compensation, collective bargaining, wage laws) and the scope of responsibilities colleges have toward their athletes. For example, this could affect benefits, health insurance and even taxes.

What are your projections for the forthcoming Olympic Games in Los Angeles, and how will the event benefit and/or hinder the region?

Hosting the 2028 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles will offer significant benefits, particularly in terms of infrastructure improvements, economic growth and job creation, while showcasing the great weather, prestige, rebuild and resilience of the city following the recent fires. By leveraging existing venues, upgrading transportation systems and repairing local infrastructures and road conditions, the city aims to enhance long-term mobility, alleviate congestion and improve air quality. Investments in hotels will bolster the local hospitality sector, generating new jobs and stimulating business growth. This regional boom is expected to result in increased tourism with an economic impact of \$11 billion. However, potential cost overruns, delays, congestion and the risk of displacing local communities remain challenges. The city will need to carefully plan, execute and manage these issues to ensure that the Olympic Games leave lasting positive changes for Los Angeles beyond 2028.

How has the financial landscape of sports and entertainment in L.A. evolved postpandemic, and what sectors have seen the strongest recovery?

The financial model for entertainment and sports has evolved from reliance on single revenue streams to multi-pronged monetization strategies. Sports teams are diversifying beyond ticket sales into real estate, media rights and venture capital investments. Entertainment companies are leveraging hubrid content distribution, balancing traditional box office with streaming and directto-consumer models. The strongest recoveries have been in live entertainment, experiential activations and high-end sponsorships, all fueled by a return to in-person engagement. Financial institutions are seeing increased demand for structured credit and advisory services as businesses recalibrate their financial strategies to this new reality.

Children's Hospital Los Angeles Opens New Cardiac Imaging Suite

CHLA is the first pediatric hospital in the United States to feature low-field MRI technology

Children's Hospital Los Angeles has opened its new Cardiac Imaging Suite, a 6,650-square-foot facility that will improve access, service and quality of care for cardiac patients featuring stateof-the-art technology that cannot be found at any other pediatric center in the United States.

The suite houses the new, FDA-approved Siemens FreeMax 0.55 Tesla MRI system, a firstin-the-nation machine for pediatrics, that will allow for new ways to image children's hearts, lungs and more.

"Children's Hospital Los Angeles is committed to pioneering the latest research and innovations in the pursuit of advancing the standards of pediatric care. It's a commitment we take seriously as one of the top pediatric cardiology and heart surgery programs in the country that routinely treats some of the most complex cardiac patients," said Paul F. Kantor, MBBCh, MSc, FRCPC, chief of the Division of Cardiology and co-director of the Heart Institute at Children's Hospital Los Angeles.

"We are thrilled to be the first in the U.S. offering this groundbreaking new technology to children and could not be more excited to harness this machine to further research and develop new applications in pediatric and fetal imaging."

Low-field MRI offers diagnostic-quality images of the heart in a quieter and much more spacious environment with a magnet that is three to six times lower in strength than today's conventional clinical systems, making it safer and more comfortable for children. While stronger magnets provide a stronger signal, any movement or air can cause distortion in the image. The low-field MRI has a weaker signal and can accommodate motion, making it ideal for imaging fetuses, the heart, lungs and GI tract.

In addition, because the patient does not need to be perfectly still, low-field MRI will reduce the need for general anesthesia in children as young as four or five years old; alternative methods of motion management with fewer side effects and preoperative restrictions can be used instead, such as virtual reality goggles. Low-field MRI is also excellent for patients who have metal implants such as pacemakers or have a larger body size, which can make it difficult to get good ultrasound or computed tomography images.

"Low-field MRI opens up a world of possibilities that can improve care for children, including the development of real-time imaging capabilities," said Dr. John Wood, director of Cardiovascular MRI at Children's Hospital Los Angeles.

"This technology will allow Children's Hospital Los Angeles to pioneer novel MRI applications, such as using the 0.55T magnet to guide procedures such as cardiac catheterizations. Using low-field MRI instead of X-ray would be a big deal for children, as limiting radiation exposure is key. The applications for lung imaging are also exciting, as there is no good way currently to monitor the progression of lung disease in babies and children. While it will take time to develop these techniques and translate them to the clinical environment, that is where we are headed thanks to this revolutionary machine."

An international MRI expert, Dr. Wood and his team were the first in the world to perform realtime imaging of a human fetal heart – without the need for cardiac synchronization – using low-field MRI.

The Cardiac Imaging Suite also features the Siemens Sola 1.5 Tesla MRI machine, five patient prep and recovery bays, an anesthesia induction room and space for a future cardiac CT scanner. The 1.5T magnet is the current gold standard for advanced cardiac MRI and delivers exceptional image clarity, ensuring high-resolution imaging and faster scan times. The suite also offers specialized stress testing for myocardial perfusion, addressing blood flow issues in the heart. Children's Hospital Los Angeles is the only facility in California providing this advanced diagnostic service, setting a new standard for pediatric cardiac imaging.

Powered by Miso's Kitchen AI and more than 25 patents, the new generation of Flippy Fry Station automates the preparation of French fries, onion rings, chicken, tacos and many other fried items with groundbreaking precision and consistency – aimed at delivering "day one" ROI to its customers with its reliability.

Among the many dangerous jobs in a commercial kitchen, the fry station towers above the rest. A 2024 survey conducted by Hart Research Associates on behalf of the National Council for Occupational Safety and Health noted that almost 80% of fast food employees have sustained burns within the past year. Unlike with traditional frying stations, federal regulations allow employees under 18 years of age to operate a Flippy Fry Station, unlocking a muchneeded additional pool of available labor for QSR kitchens.

Dennis Lock, Miso's head of sales, commented, "With no upfront costs and a rental price of \$5,400 per month, the new generation of Flippy generally costs less than the equivalent full-time employees, so there is little downside for restaurant operators. Plus, Flippy can drive \$5,000 to \$20,000 of new prime cost reductions and revenue increases per month through labor redeployment to higher value tasks, faster speed of service and reduced food waste."

Shopoff Realty Investments Acquires Buena Park Site with Plans for Redevelopment

Formerly home to Amway's SoCal operations, the infill project will bring residential units to Orange County

hopoff Realty Investments recently acquired a 13.75-acre site at 5600 Beach Blvd. in Buena Park from Amway for \$60 million, the latest in a group of developments set to convert underutilized and aging properties in Orange County into residential housing and apartments. For the Irvine-based developer, the Buena Park site is one of several residential infill developments in various stages of construction. Other projects include Uptown Newport, Magnolia Coast and redevelopment of the Westminster Mall.

Developers have had to deal with rising costs related to higher interest rates but are now facing additional costs related to labor, tariffs and overall market volatility. In addition to those factors, it can be difficult to find large development sites in urban markets where there are few vacant parcels, but opportunities exist and contingencies can help plan for price increases.

"Our business has been hard for a year-and-ahalf to two years. If we look at May through the end of the year, we feel really good. This could be my best year ever for the company and for myself personally," said Bill Shopoff, principal of the firm that he started in 1992.

Converting properties is a multi-year process, but recent progress has led to new acquisitions. Progress at existing developments has made Shopoff confident for 2025 despite a slow start in the first quarter. Overall, Shopoff Realty senior management owns and operates 30 million square feet of commercial property and has entitled more than 41,000 residential lots or units since inception of the firm.

For the Buena Park site, the company secured the acquisition with \$49 million in financing with support from JLL Capital Markets. Site plans are still being developed but will consist of a mix of residential units that will replace two aging industrial buildings that total 370,000 square feet.

Although projects are moving forward, Shopoff paused to reflect on the recent wildfires that devastated Southern California. As a real estate developer, he recognizes that there may be opportunities to assist with rebuilding efforts but has opted not to participate in the recovery until the needs become clearer.

"The first opportunity is to have compassion for people impacted by the fires," said Shopoff. "Our bigger concern out of the fires is the insurance industry and what happens to insure residential and commercial projects. We don't have an answer, but it's impactful," he said.

The project in Buena Park became available when nutritional supplement manufacturer Amway decided to shutter its Southern California operations and consolidate at its Michigan headquarters. It will invest more than \$100 million there and create 260 jobs in conjunction with the move, which will happen by the end of 2026. The company signed a short-term lease back as it transitions operations.

"A short-term lease back comes with challenges and benefits. We specialize in corporate transactions and understand the complexities involved," said Cameron Ghassemi, senior vice president of acquisitions at Shopoff.

That time will allow Shopoff to entitle the property and begin preparations to redevelop it into a residential development while collecting income to offset some of the carrying costs. Initial discussion with city leadership has been positive, especially because this housing development wasn't included in regional housing needs assessment, and it will help the city meet a statewide goal that mandates cities meet housing needs. One common theme between all of the Shopoff projects is the infill development converts an underutilized commercial property into a residential development. In addition, a key element is the inclusion of affordable housing units. Shopoff expects to deliver approximately 500 affordable units across four projects.

"At this stage in my career, I'm equally proud that 500 families will find housing that couldn't find housing. It's important that we do that for our communities and our society," Shopoff said.

At Magnolia Coast, a 28.9-acre oceanfront land parcel in Huntington Beach that previously housed massive fuel storage tanks, plans include more than 200 single-family homes, as well as a 50-unit apartment complex, a 215-room boutique hotel, and approximately 19,000 square feet of retail space. Affordable housing is a component of the project, and 25 units have been set aside for workers at the hotel. In February, Lionheart Strategic Management LLC provided \$60.9 million in financing to move the project forward following approval from the California Coastal Commission.

Meanwhile, construction is ready to begin on Park Palm, the latest element of the firm's flagship Uptown Newport development. The firm expects to break ground in the latter half of the year on the 60-unit luxury condominium project, which completes the first phase of construction. The entire development is entitled for 1,244 residential units, of which 548 units will be developed in the first phase. Some of those are apartments and some are for-sale housing. Two projects that have been completed include 458 luxury apartments and 30 condos. The condos have a price point ranging from \$2 to \$5 million and 25 have already been sold. The site also includes a one-acre park that is privately owned but open to the public.

"The future for Southern California and coastal communities in general in populated areas is infill development, whether it's office, industrial or even school sites," said Brian Rupp, executive vice president of real estate for Shopoff Realty.

Legal Experts Highlight Key IP Trends To Watch

From AI to embedded content, litigation and potential new laws could shape the future of IP

Al continues to raise novel IP issues, but open questions over things like the applicability of doctrines

such as fair use show signs of reaching a resolution in the year ahead. According to Justin Hughes, a professor at Loyola Law School who teaches patent law and intellectual property, one anticipated trend in AI-related copyright litigation is that the sheer volume of new lawsuits from content creators and publishers against AI platforms is likely to slow.

"In copyright, litigation over AI training sets has been fast and furious for the past three years. I assume we will see a slowdown in the number of new cases filed," Hughes stated in an email.

"More importantly, my guess is that we are going to see more of these disputes settle. With the growing number of business deals between major content owners and Al companies, it is getting harder for the Al companies to argue that it is fair use under 17 U.S.C. 107 to train on the content of everyone else with whom they don't do deals. The recent district court decision in *Thomson Reuters v. Ross Intelligence* – written by a Third Circuit judge sitting by designation – also doesn't help the Al companies. So, I expect to see more settlements."

The precise impact of the *Thomson Reuters* case – in which a federal judge in Delaware ruled that an AI legal research company infringed on Thomson Reuters' intellectual property by improperly accessing and copying content from the Westlaw legal research platform – isn't clear.

The court ruled against the defendant's attempt to invoke the fair use defense but limited its decision to non-generative AI.

"I will be surprised if that decision becomes a hugely significant decision just because it is so fact specific," said Steven Stein, a partner with Greenberg Glusker Fields Claman & Machtinger





LLP who focuses on media, intellectual property, entertainment and business disputes.

Stein thinks the *New York Times et al. v. OpenAl* case, ongoing in the Southern District of New York, will be a far more significant test of whether fair use is an adequate defense against allegations Al companies improperly scrape data. The newspaper and other media organizations accuse OpenAl of improperly accessing their data to train its Al models.

"The New York Times case could definitely have broader implications for OpenAI and for AI generally," Stein said. "And I think if there is an adverse ruling against OpenAI, I think it's going to lead to and require AI companies to license content from companies like the New York Times to use in connection with their AI, even if it just involves training that AI."

The case, depending on the outcome, could "also lead to legislation being passed or considered to try to address the ramifications of that decision, because it obviously has what would have a huge impact on this emerging industry," Stein said.

Although there was no significant federal Al legislation in the pipeline, Stein said lawmakers would likely also be looking at a pending U.S.



Copyright Office report on the same issue being litigated by The New York Times. The office has been conducting a three-part evaluation of AI and copyright issues, with two reports already released and a third expected later this year examining the legal implications of training AI models on copyrighted works.

International Termination Rights

Outside of AI, Stein said that a potential broadening of copyright terminations to overseas jurisdictions was an issue firmly on his radar for the year ahead.

Termination provisions allow creators to reclaim ownership rights to their work during a five-year window that opens on the 35th year after the original licensing agreement took effect. Stein explained that this legal mechanism often protects authors who license content before its market value is established.

"Part of the issue has been that a lot of people think copyright termination is limited to the United States," Stein explained. "So, for example, if you have a copyright in the United States and you license it, and then you terminate the copyright, the idea has been or most people often the termination only applies within the United States."

This can create issues when it comes time for authors to try to "renegotiate and get a better deal," as they lack the international rights to the work, Stein said.

However, a recent ruling in *Vetter v. Resnick*, in the Middle District of Louisiana, significantly expanded copyright termination rights, establishing that the termination of rights for The Swingin' Medallions' 1966 song "Double Shot (Of My Baby's Love)" applies both domestically and internationally.

"Many commentators believe that the court got it wrong, but that decision is being appealed to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, and it's very interesting to see what the 5th Circuit, and ultimately, maybe even the United States Supreme Court, does with that, because there's a lot of wheeling and dealing in Hollywood relating to IP and copyright termination notices, and if, in fact, the termination notice applies to broad, to rights internationally that would have a major impact in the entertainment industry," Stein said.

A Potential Embedded Content Circuit Split

Copyright infringement as it pertains to the use of embedded videos on websites, and the potential for the issue to land before the U.S. Supreme Court, is another development catching Stein's attention.

Future-Proofing the Next Generation of Lawyers





Southern California's law schools embrace technology to prepare students for employment in a rapidly changing legal landscape

s the early 2000s gave way to the mid-century, one thing that continually occupied real estate in headlines was a simple, if not ominous question: "Will technology take my job?" From mailrooms to boardrooms, the idea that automation, including the advent and rapid adoption of artificial intelligence (AI) would have significant ramifications on employment was inescapable, including in the legal profession.

Technology hasn't replaced lawyers, doctors or other professionals, but it's a key tool to help them better practice their specialized professions. At local law schools, technologies like AI have quickly grown from a new and interesting trend into a tool that is essential to learn and incorporate into education and legal practice.

To that end, the University of Southern California's Gould School of Law launched a new program that offers a certificate for law and artificial intelligence. It's a 12-unit certificate that is offered on a part-time basis as a standalone program at law school. Enrollment is open to both students and other members of the community who take the coursework.

"Technology is a great equalizer. There's no going back. This has fundamentally changed how the law operates," said Dean Franita Tolson, who is a nationally recognized expert in election law, who was named dean of the school last year after serving as interim dean during the prior year and vice dean for faculty and academic affairs from 2019 to 2022.

When AI was first adopted as a mainstream technology, it generated concerns related to



the potential for cheating. However, those fears quickly changed as the advantages of utilizing technology to review documents or research case law offered clear advantages. By providing exposure to technology at law school, Tolson recognized that it helps make students more marketable when they graduate and enter the legal profession. Ultimately, students need to have real-life skills in addition to a strong educational foundation to meet the needs of the firms and major companies that seek to hire law school graduates, and AI's time-savings benefits far outweigh the chances it will be used maliciously.

Other schools have created similar offerings. UC Berkeley Law will launch an Al-focused Master of Laws (LLM) degree law program this summer. The program can be completed over two summers or through remote study combined with one summer on campus.

Student groups have been formed to create programs devoted to education about artificial intelligence. At UCLA School of Law, the Al Law Association at UCLA was founded two years ago and develops programs such as industry panels, skills workshops and research publications. The group promotes Al tools as a complement to traditional legal education, but also stimulates conversations about the ethical and logistical consequences of technological disruption in the legal industry.

In California, there were 18 new laws signed by Governor Newsom that went into effect on Jan. 1 that directly addressed artificial intelligence. There are now significant regulations regarding deepfake technology, AI transparency, data privacy, and use of AI in medical records and health care. California is at the forefront of this technology, with many Silicon Valley area companies working on large language models and their implementation into all aspects of business and compliance with new and evolving laws regarding intellectual property and privacy. Some laws permit a private right of action, but most focus on state oversight to keep AI transparent and protect the public from misuse.

Furthermore, AB 2013 will go into effect in 2026 and requires developers to disclose extensive details about the data used to train their large language models going back to 2022 including sources, types and whether it includes copyrighted information. This type of documentation is designed to provide some transparency, but could create compliance issues

For GRSM, growth has come through a unique 50-state strategy, providing advantages and challenges

n growing a law business, there are milestones, and then there are *milestones*. For one firm, it's evident in their tagline: "Your 50-State Law Firm."

Gordon Rees Scully Mansukhani, or GRSM, is the only firm in the U.S. with offices in every state, and reaching that 50-state milestone in 2019 has led not only to a unique distinction, but to faster growth.

t continues to grow and add new offices, especially in Southern California – where there is a need to service clients in its large cities – but also in the Central Valley and Inland Empire. It opened offices in Ontario in 2021 and Ventura County in 2024. Revenue has more than doubled at the San Francisco-based firm since it opened in Hawaii in 2019, the last state needed to achieve its goal. This year, it's on pace to surpass \$900 million in revenue this year and could surpass \$1 billion in the near future. That's compared to \$351 million in revenue in 2019, when the Hawaii office opened.

"We keep getting more – and bigger – work from the largest companies in America," said Miles Scully, a name partner with the firm who is credited as the architect of its growth strategy. "We hit a need that most people didn't know existed for one firm to cover all 50 states. It means that

trio of high-powered banking executives has joined new-to-Southern-California BMO Financial Group in Los Angeles to lead the \$1.5 trillion bank's wealth management, business banking and California oper-

ations. The three veteran bankers have diverse backgrounds, joining from different banks and are based in BMO's new office in Century City.

Michele Havens was appointed BMO's head of U.S. private wealth and will lead national operations from her office in Los Angeles. She will work alongside Tony Sciarrino, who was hired as head of U.S. Commercial Bank and Halé Behzadi as vice chair for California. All three executives will report directly to BMO's U.S. chief executive Darrel Hackett.

"We had the opportunity to bring in some incredible senior talent. It wasn't necessarily by design that we had three senior leaders right here in Southern California, but there's great talent in this market. A network of branches is important, but having an office located amidst myriad high-profile law firms, media and entertainment companies, and other professional services has elevated their ability to meet their clients wherever they are located.

Engaging With a New Community

BMO is headquartered in Montreal, with its U.S. headquarters in Chicago. While it has a deep history of doing business in California dating back 160 years, it historically had the deepest market penetration in the Midwest.

That changed with its \$16.3 billion acquisition of Bank of the West in 2023 that added nearly 1.8 million customers and more than 500 additional branches, commercial banking and wealth management offices. Bank of the West was a West Coast regional bank with offices in nine states that was headquartered in San Francisco. The company

had more than \$90 billion in assets at the time of the acquisition. As of January 31, 2025, BMO Financial Group was the eighth largest bank in North America by assets, with total assets of \$1.5 trillion.


BMO's expansion occurred at a volatile time for the banking sector. Just a few weeks after the close of the Bank of the West acquisition, Silicon Valley Bank collapsed. This stunning development was followed shortly by the shuttering of both Signature Bank and First Republic Bank. The veteran banking executives saw that volatility in the market was seen as an opportunity for growth.

"We've only begun, and you're going to see us double down in this market in a big way. We're going to be known as California's bank and as the best commercial bank on the continent," said Scirriano.

After integrating operations with Bank of the West. BMO secured beneficial and highly noticeable partnerships with soccer teams LAFC and Angel City Football Club, in addition to naming rights to the now-named BMO Stadium in Exposition Park. Those deals stood as exemplary of how organizations that operate with a similar purpose reach out to, and want to do more, for their communities. BMO is also a partner with Major League Soccer teams CF Montréal, the Vancouver Whitecaps and Toronto FC.

"We partnered with [the teams] not just because they have an audience that is attracted to us, but they operate with a similar purpose. Our purpose is to boldly grow the good in business and life," said Hackett.

Angel City allocates 10% of the partnership back into the community through the Angel City sponsorship model. For the BMO partnership, it supported Girls Play Los Angeles, which enables



400 high school-aged girls and non-binary youth across Los Angeles access to soccer.

It extended those local team partnerships this year with BMO "fan cards," which are available with a BMO personal checking account. The card offers fans access to special team events, discounts on apparel and gear, and other exclusive perks. It partnered with LAFC's Denis Bouanga and Angel City FC's Madison Hammond to promote the fan cards with a new series of commercials.

A Comprehensive Wildfire Response With a Personal Story

When wildfires destroyed thousands of homes in Southern California, including several employees and customers, BMO responded by contributing \$3 million to relief efforts, marking one of the largest donations from a financial services company. Sadly, Havens was among those who lost their homes.

"I couldn't have been more touched by how well BMO showed up for me and my family. We have another colleague who also lost his home entirely and many, many others that were disrupted by the evacuations. Going forward, access is absolutely critical, and we've seen locally the banking community already come together," said Havens.

California Tourism Industry Unites in L.A. to Drive Post-Wildfire Economic Recovery

Visit California spotlights the region and the transformative power of travel at annual Outlook Forum

> n a powerful demonstration of resilience and unity, the California tourism industry recently gathered in Los Angeles for the first time since January's wildfires – reaffirming the state's commitment to recovery and economic revitalization. More than 900 tourism executives,

travel marketing professionals and other industry stakeholders convened at their annual Outlook Forum conference to collectively chart a path forward, emphasizing the vital role tourism plays in supporting the state's economy and workforce.


Led by Visit California, the industry's response to the recent crisis was both swift and strategic. Recognizing the wildfires' widespread impact on traveler perceptions and local businesses, Visit California convened its first emergency board meeting in five years, resulting in a \$4.3-million crisis recovery fund. The allocation is fueling a data-driven marketing campaign aimed at countering misinformation and reigniting visitor confidence nationwide.

Early in the crisis, misleading reports led to consumers believing half of Los Angeles County had burned – when in reality, less than 2% of the region was affected directly by fires. Addressing misconceptions is critical in reassuring both domestic and international travelers that Los Angeles remains open as a premier global destination and that visitors can still have an exceptional experience here.

Beyond economic recovery, the industry has rallied to support hospitality workers, who are at the heart of Los Angeles' tourism experience. Restaurants Care, which provides grants to impacted restaurant employees, and the California Community Foundation Wildfire Recovery Fund, which has already raised nearly \$6 million, have received overwhelming industry support.

Despite the challenges, Los Angeles' tourism future appears strong. Last year, visitor spending reached a record \$156 billion, while international travel rebounded to 94% of pre-pandemic levels. Further on the horizon, the state is set to host two Super Bowls, another NBA All-Star Weekend, FIFA World Cup matches and the 2028 Olympics, reinforcing its position as a global hub for worldclass events and experiences. These milestones highlight the industry's resilience and the collective effort to ensure Southern California and the state at large remain among the world's most sought-after travel destinations.

This month's top deals from around Southern California

Clearlake Capital's acquisition of Dun & Bradstreet leads March M&A activity in Southern California

> lobal M&A activity ticked up in 2024 after two years of declines,

according to Pitchbook's annual Global M&A report. With a strong first quarter, activity could increase for two consecutive years for the first time in a decade.

In Southern California, recent deals include several multi-billion transactions led by Los Angeles-based private equity firm Clearlake Capital Group's proposed acquisition of Dun & Bradstreet for \$4.1 billion in cash, plus assumption of <u>debt.</u>

Dun & Bradstreet was founded 184 years ago and has undergone two stints as a private company. Its most recent initial public offering in 2020 valued Dun & Bradstreet at about \$9 billion, but its value declined by about 60% prior to Clearlake's offer of \$9.15 per share, which was a 4.8% premium to its prior close.

"We have been on a strategic journey over the past six years, executing a major transformation that has strengthened our business and financial results," said Anthony Jabbour, chief executive of Dun & Bradstreet, in a statement.

Ares Credit Funds and HSBC also participated in the committed financing for the transaction. The deal is expected to close in the third quarter.

A Busy Year for L.A. County Law Firms

Fires, mergers and relocations part of a 2025 that is shaping up to be a banner year for legal representation

t has been a busy year for the 125 largest law firms in Los Angeles County, which have navigated financial challenges, regulatory issues, an election and natural disasters. All have contributed to an ever-changing landscape where technology has taken an increased role.

Consolidation and expansion were among the biggest changes to the legal sector in Los Angeles over the past year. Westwood-based healthcare firm **Nelson Hardiman** merged with Pittsburgh firm **Leech Tishman** in September. The combined firm has 12 offices nationwide and operates under the new moniker **Leech Tishman Nelson Hardiman Inc.**

Harry Nelson, a partner at Leetch Tishman Nelson Hardiman, said that he spent 15 years seeking a growth partner and spoke to more than 100 firms of various sizes about a merger. The firm works primarily within the healthcare sector, which Nelson described as fundamentally a middle-market industry due to the prevalence of physician groups, pharmacies and labs.

"We needed to find lawyers that could round out practices in intellectual property and employment," he said. Nelson added that the Los Angeles firm had a growing number of clients on the East Coast and needed a strong New York presence.

Nelson Hardiman's healthcare specialty had evolved and expanded as the industry underwent a profound transformation in the way that healthcare is delivered with technology, telemedicine, changes to the payer/payee relationship and FDA practices. The most important part of a proposed merger for Nelson was finding a partner who would support the many smaller medical practices and companies that were clients, rather than solely focusing on the national healthcare and life science clients.

"We're only six months in, but it's been a homerun," said Nelson. "We're building a premier specialty practice for ourselves and rounding out to a full service offering."

Local Growth

For **Willkie Farr & Gallagher LLP**, growth has happened quickly since opening a local office in September 2021. The firm has 100 attorneys, including 32 partners in Los Angeles, compared with just three attorneys who spearheaded the new office when it first opened. It was part of a major West Coast expansion that included offices in San Francisco and Palo Alto, which opened in 2019 and 2018, respectively.

Recent local additions include Douglas C. Emhoff, former Second Gentleman of the United States, in a move to private practice for the former high-ranking government official. Emhoff joined as a partner and has more than three decades of experience as a litigator and trusted counsel to clients and global business leaders. Other recent additions also include litigators Jason Linder and Glenn Vanzura from Mayer Brown.

Last year, the firm launched the LA Office Foundation, which was funded with contributions from L.A.based partners and matched by the firm. The foundation partnered with Vista Del Mar Child and Family Services to help establish a new substance abuse disorder treatment center for children ages 12-17.

Downtown Relocation

Reed Smith relocated its 110person downtown office to City National Plaza at 515 S. Flower St. The firm's new space covers more than 41,000 square feet on two floors, providing room to grow. Features of the newly renovated space include universally sized offices and hoteling work stations, as well as three conference rooms and two special-purpose areas integrated with the firm's HD video conferencing technology. The new office tower holds an Energy Star label and LEED Platinum certification, the highest level available.

At 350 S. Grand Ave., two firms relocated offices within the past uear from elsewhere within downtown. Sheppard Mullin moved its headquarters to Bunker Hill.

"Our downtown Los Angeles office is our largest office and continues to add leadership and depth across our practices. A new, modern and efficient workspace will accommodate both immediate and future growth needs," said Luca Salvi, chair of Sheppard Mullin, in a statement.

Alston & Bird moved to the same building last year and it added a new office in Century City. Recent matters for the firm include representing Beverly Hills-based Platinum Equity as debt financing counsel in its acquisition of a majority interest in dairy products brands Horizon Organic and Wallaby from Danone.

Meanwhile, Hanson Bridgett marked the 10th anniversary of its Los Angeles office by relocating to the CalEdison DTLA, where it nearly doubled the size of its previous office.

he 125 largest law firms with offices in Los Angeles County employ more than 9,000 attorneys in local offices. That includes 3,780 partners, plus associates, counsel and other staff attorneys.

Firms handle litigation and transactional work across a diverse range of industries spanning entertainment, finance, aerospace, media and others. The two largest firms have roots in Los Angeles. Gibson Dunn & Crutcher LLP, the largest firm with 317 local attorneys between offices in Century City and DTLA, was founded in Los Angeles in 1890, but does not recognize an official headquarters location as an international firm. It has more than 2,000 attorneys in 21 offices worldwide. Los Angeles-based Sheppard, Mullin, Richter & Hampton LLP, which has offices in Century City and DTLA, is the only other firm with more than 300 attorneys in Los Angeles.

There are a total of 166 offices for the firms listed because some firms have multiple offices. Firms with dual locations tend to handle more entertainment work in Century City while downtown firms may handle more litigation.

Overall, the top 125 firms employ more than 16,000 people in Los Angeles County.

He explained that a recent New York federal court decision in *Richardson v. Townsquare Media* diverged from previous New York rulings by finding that embedding YouTube videos does not constitute copyright infringement.

The court applied fair use principles for one video and determined YouTube's terms of service granted an implicit license for the second. This ruling differed from the findings of other New York federal courts that have held embedding does infringe, contrasting with the 9th Circuit's position that it does not. The Richardson decision potentially sets the stage for an eventual Supreme Court review of this contentious copyright issue, Stein said, if the 2nd Circuit took up the issue and ruled differently to the 9th circuit.

Stein said that "it's certainly not imminent, but it's possible" that the issue could "rise to the level of the Supreme Court in the not-too-distant future."

Music Copyright Claims on the Rise

Stein said that music publishing companies are increasingly pursuing copyright infringement claims against organizations that use unlicensed music in social media content, with Sony recently filing a lawsuit against USC for music used in university-related social media posts. "Out of all these music infringement cases that have been filed, there haven't really been rulings in them that address or speak to the issues implicated by these claims. Most of these cases are settled. So, if any of these cases are ever litigated, and there are many pending, including the one that was filed last week [against USC], it'd be very interesting to see what the judges do with them."

Open Questions on Vicarious Liability

Hughes said that he would be keeping an eye on whether the U.S. Supreme Court would take up the question of whether the 4th Circuit correctly upheld a jury verdict that Cox Communications willfully contributed to copyright infringement because it knew of its users' infringing activity and materially contributed to it.

"If the Supreme Court grants cert. in *Cox Communications v. Sony Music Entertainment,* we could get some reshaping of the contours of indirect liability in copyright law. Some folks think the Fourth Circuit erred in its contributory liability analysis, while others – myself included – think the appellate court created confusion, if not an outright circuit split, on vicarious liability," he wrote.

He also anticipated that the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) would continue

to crack down on the "monopolize" slogans and words.


"It's not a 'court' per se, but my guess is that the Trademark Trial and Appeal Board at USPTO will quietly continue to strengthen its 'failure to function' decisions as a way to deny trademark registration to slogans and single words that are being claimed as trademarks, but really are just efforts to monopolize control of words on t-shirts and other apparel – more power to them in this effort," he wrote.

orporate attorneys handle a wide range of transactions, financing and M&A deals. At top corporate firm Kirkland & Ellis, Los Angeles-based attorneys served as lead counsel on announced deals that totaled more than \$16 billion in 2024. That included six deals greater than \$1 billion. Other major matters include advising Energy Capital Partners on a \$6.7-billion closing of its fifth flagship equity strategy, which surpassed the fund's \$4-billion target. On the debt side, Kirkland & Ellis advised Thoma Bravo in its all-cash acquisition of Darktrace plc., a cybersecurity company, in a transaction that included \$2.3 billion of debt financing.

Attorneys at Proskauer advised Los Angeles-based investment firm Shamrock Capital on the closing of two funds last year that had approximately \$1.6 billion in assets combined. At Los Angeles-based Greenberg Glusker, notable transactions include advising apparel brand Off Season on the launch of the company. Meanwhile, the attorneys in the Los Angeles office of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison LLP represented Stone Point Capital on the debt financing aspects of its \$15.5-billion acquisition of Truist Insurance Holdings.



abor and employment attorneys specialize in a practice group that can impact all industries, but tend to focus on labor-intensive work such as health care, hospitality, automotive and retail. Issues are complex and there are various federal, state and local laws governing wages which drive demand for this niche.

Recent statewide issues that labor and employment practice groups have focused on include a ban on non-compete agreements that went into effect last year. AB 1076 specifies that California's statutory provision voiding noncompete contracts is broadly construed to void the application of any noncompete agreement in an employment context, or any noncompete clause in an employment contract, no matter how narrowly tailored, that does not satisfy specified exceptions. In addition, a law that requires employers to create and implement a written workplace violence prevention plan went into effect on July 1.

Overall, the 25 largest labor and employment practice groups in Los Angeles County reported 910 attorneys for the specialty in local offices, which included 350 partners."

itigation practice groups can engage across a wide range of industries from intellectual property to insurance, white-collar defense, class actions and dozens of other areas. As a group, the 25 largest litigation practice groups in Los Angeles employ approximately 1,850 attorneys.

Quinn Emanuel is one of the largest litigation firms in Los Angeles with 199 local attorneys. It was one of the first firms to file a lawsuit related to the wildfires when it filed a nine-count lawsuit against Southern California Edison for the Eaton Fire. It filed suit for the Davis family of Altadena, who lost their home in Altadena.

"They are our neighbors, our friends, our clients and this never should have happened," said John Quinn, executive chairman of the firm and Pasadena resident.

Other notable litigation unrelated to the wildfires that involved local attorneys included Loeb & Loeb's successfully representation of The Claremont Colleges in a favorable resolution to an eight-year dispute with the Claremont School of Theology in 2024. The case involved five actions, three appeals and an arbitration. The Claremont Colleges completed the acquisition of the property in December 2024. At Glaser Weil, the Los Angeles office launched two new practice groups last year, focused on advanced transportation and energy transition as well as affordable housing."

he real estate sector has faced immense challenges stemming from the recent wildfires. In the wake of these devastating tragedies, real estate practice groups have advised on issues such as land use, zoning, building codes, environmental laws and building approval process with governmental agencies. When people are ready to move forward with rebuilding, real estate attorneys advise on construction agreements, architects' agreements, mortgage financing and transactions.

Many firms offered pro bono support to victims of the wildfires, have raised funds to contribute for wildfire relief efforts and have supported the process of navigating FEMA and other agencies that provide benefits to fire victims. In addition to fires, there are significant state laws that impact commercial real estate development. Enacted in 2025, AB 98 addresses large warehouse construction and mandates truck routing plans for these facilities.

Overall, the 25 largest real estate practice groups in Los Angeles County reported 518 attorneys for the specialty in local offices, which included 286 partners."







AN IN-DEPTH LOOK AT LAW SCHOOLS AND THEIR PROGRAMS

Business by LA Times Studios presents the 25 largest law schools operating in California. The 25 largest law schools on the next pages awarded more than 2,200 degrees last year.

While schools are affiliated with larger universities, several schools are independent law schools that offer a wide range of programs, including University of California College of the Law in San Francisco and Southwestern Law School in Los Angeles.

Many law schools are accredited by the American Bar Association. Law schools approved by the American Bar Association must maintain a 75% two-year cumulative pass rate.

In California, some schools are accredited by the State Bar of California. These state-accredited law schools may offer online-only programs. All state-accredited law schools must maintain a minimum, five-year cumulative bar passage rate of 40% or higher. Unaccredited law schools are not required to maintain a minimum bar pass rate.

Most law schools responded to questionnaires for this list, but in some instances, information from accreditation reports was utilized.

The number of law schools in California declined last year. Golden Gate University School of Law in San Francisco discontinued its program due to declining enrollment and financial troubles.

Many law schools offer clinics that allow students an opportunity to gain experience around various areas of law. For example, UCLA School of Law operates a Tribal Legal Development Clinic to improve the lives of Indigenous people throughout California and the country. The school received a \$2.2 million grant from the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians in October 2024 to further support the ongoing work of that clinic.

On the following pages, you'll also find in-depth profiles of law schools that offer a wide array of programs and classes to fit a diverse California student population.

Overall, the 25 largest law schools in California have more than 7.400 students enrolled as of Jan. 1.

as many companies did not track this information previously in the manner that needs to be disclosed under the law.

New Programs For a Changing Legal Landscape

USC Gould School of Law is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year, and Dean Tolson explained that the school prides itself on engaging with new and evolving areas of law as part of its long history of innovation. The first modern legal aid program grew out of a USC Gould clinic established in 1929. It has developed new programs as the university expanded, currently offering 15 dual-degree programs.

This fall, USC Gould will launch a sports, media, entertainment and technology center to capitalize on the major events such as the World Cup, Olympics and Super Bowl coming to Southern California in the next few years. The school created a program that connects students with internships at local sports teams, law firms and other sports industry companies. The sports, media and entertainment industry has grown tremendously over the past few years as studentathletes gained the legal right to commercialize their name, image and likeness and the growth of streaming services.

"We are well past the time of people being able to graduate and think like lawyers. They need to have some expectations of how a transaction works. There is an obligation that we have to make sure our students are prepared," said Tolson.

Clinics are a vital part of practical, hands-on training for attorneys. At Loyola Law School in Downtown Los Angeles, Dean Brietta Clark described the work done at the school's 20 different legal clinics that ranges from working with children to immigrant justice, a project for the innocent and a focus on working with those who have suffered from atrocities. Clark, an alumnus of USC Gould, was named dean of Loyola Law School last year after serving as interim dean. She joined the law school faculty in 2001.

"The clinics are grounded in our mission as a Jesuit university. It's an aspect of the program that draws people to us because they want to make a difference as soon as possible," said Clark.

While clinics are an excellent opportunity for students to gain real life work experience, at USC Gould, a different type of program was launched under Tolson's leadership that provides opportunities for visiting professors to teach at the school, offering a chance to spend a year or two in an academic role while simultaneously spending time writing a law article.

"We want to do our part to make it more accessible to those who don't consider teaching. They just need an opportunity," said Tolson.

Campus Life: Onsite, Remote or Hybrid

In addition to enhanced course offerings, Tolson's hiring coincided with a major fundraising campaign to support the construction of a new and dedicated law school building. The proposed six-level building will provide USC Gould with an additional 55,000 square feet and will be located directly west of the current Musick Law Building. The campaign seeks to raise \$50 million and the school is hosting numerous events as part of its year-long celebration of its 125th anniversary that will also benefit future student bodies.

Even as schools expand physically to meet the needs of the next generation of lawyers, at Loyola Law School, Dean Clark noted that technology has also changed the way that students interact with the physical campus, leading them to develop a hybrid learning program. The school had a part-time program that traditionally met four evenings per week, but that changed due to COVID-19.

"COVID really escalated the idea that so much more legal work is becoming online. Many court appearances are now remote. We need to incorporate technology into education to show students what the practice looks like – today and tomorrow."







a general counsel could call one attorney for all of their legal problems."

Scully and firm chief executive Dion Cominos started working with the firm when it had a single office in San Francisco with 40 attorneys and have been integral leaders of the firm's expansion. GRSM's total attorney headcount has grown to 1,682 attorneys as of March 1, which makes it one of the 15 largest firms in the country. There are an additional 1,443 staff employed across its 82 offices firmwide.

Moreover, growth has come organically through hiring rather than by merger or acquisition. Firm leadership traveled to many different states to recruit attorneys to join the firm. In some instances, it has added groups of attorneys, but it has refrained from making wholesale acquisitions, which could be problematic and come with unknown liabilities.

"We have very motivated, educated, ambitious people and we haven't had a problem with allowing people to work remotely or part-time to fit their lifestyle," said Cominos. With offices in every state, the firm can offer consistent pricing while handling litigation and transactions anywhere rather than needing to partner with a local or regional firm for cases or transactions where it doesn't have a location. Clients know that they can call the firm and it can handle work in all locales.

For employees, a collateral advantage has been the ability to stay with the firm without sacrificing a job should a spouse need to relocate. Plus, during the pandemic, employees were able to relocate and still remain with the firm as it has offices nationwide.

These regional offices can accommodate employees by shortening commute times and aid remote employees who don't need to be in an office every day. By meeting the needs of its employees with flexible work arrangements when needed, offering regional offices and by utilizing technology to keep employees connected, it has built a diverse workforce with low attrition rate, including 25% female ownership, among the upper tier of large firms.

"We and our clients believe that having a diverse law firm is a symbol of strength. At the same time, that can be accomplished in a lawful way without quotas and discrimination. We promote the best people. There doesn't have to be this feeling that firms can't be diverse, they just need to use legal means to get there," said Cominos.

Running a firm as large as GRSM, let alone one with locations in every state, can present challenges. Cominos explained that each state has a separate bar association that regulates lawyers. Employment laws vary state-by-state, but those challenges are similar for all large companies. There are also complexities with filing tax returns in every state, but he said that the benefits of aggregation have far outweighed any of the challenges.

"We would have regressed," Cominos said, if it were not for the growth. Instead, "we're taking business from regional firms. It's been well worth it."
